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SALLY DEVLIN: Thank you. Again my name is Sally Devlin. And my theme is the utter and complete arrogance of the DOE. And I'll give you a very good example, because as you know I've been in on this for years. And it's always a joy to meet people from out of state, and especially people from Wisconsin, because they're number one in education with their former governor Tommy Thompson.

What I want to bring to your attention is some years ago they had Fisoff (phonetic) from Russia. This is 55 metric tons of undocumented uranium. And we went over to Russia and the Ukraine and we grabbed everything we could. Well, they had a meeting and they had the five foot shelf, as you saw from my friend from Citizen Alert standing on, and this report. And they wanted to put the Fisoff fuel in the mountains in Maine, drill a hole 15 kilometers down and then put the fuel in and cover it with cement.

1 And fortunately Grant Hudlow and Dale Shooty and I went to this meeting in a windstorm in Las Vegas. It was unbelievable. And we said you're out of your minds. Granite is porous. And as a result, and I hear our friend and welcome him from Wisconsin, talking about granite. All of these rocks are porous, and they will eventually dissolve either through microbic invasion, those are my bugs, or through natural erosion and whathaveyou.

2 Therefore what is the government doing? They put 55 metric tons at SRS. And what did our friend were from Savannah River say from South Carolina? That's the most -- second most polluted place in the country. And I read volumes on it and it's criminal what they have done to SRS. Next to Hanford it is number two. There's no question about it.

3, 4 This is the intent and I say the arrogance, and I use that word in all its meaning, that the government can just go and dump into Nevada not one but two repositories. And I'll give you an idea of costs that's not mentioned. When they talk about 17,000, 15,000, 10,000 canisters, I have attended all those meetings. As you know they have nothing to make them out of. They have nothing acceptable that will not corrode or my bugs won't eat or that will hold this very hot stuff.

When I started it was 1360 degrees C. It is now down to 360. Is that pretty close, Abe? It's gotten a lot cooler. That's what the thermologists are so proud of. And I say to them you can't roast a marshmallow. 360 degrees C is very hot. 37 degrees C is almost a hundred degrees Fahrenheit, so it's ten times more.

5... So what we're talking about not only will kill everybody in transport, and they have no transport plan. They have no plan for the repository or the tunnels. They have no plan of how anything is going to do, and they're talking on these canisters without the transportation or whathaveyou 300 to \$500,000 apiece. If you have enough fingers you can get an idea of the cost, and double that for two repositories. Double and triple these

5 cont. moneys again for fuel from the DOD which the DOE has accepted and has classified and we have no idea how it will go in the mountain.

So this is just a few things that I feel are not only the arrogance of the DOE, but since they have no supervision and everything comes from the top, the only way we, the public, can change all of this is to get people elected to the Congress who are human beings and not only bought by money.

And if we have to buy them, as they did with contracts and whathaveyou, there are very few M&Os, meaning the people that do the contracting, it probably costs them 30 million to buy the contract. We may have to raise 30 million to buy the Congress. And this is the only way we are going to stop Yucca Mountain because the DOE is totally arrogant, totally inured to the people and totally irresponsible towards us. They are responsible to our elected officials. |
